Harvey by Mary Chase

Directed By: Teacher

Show Synopsis provided by Dramatist Play Service:

"Elwood P. Dowd insists on including his friend Harvey in all of his sister Veta's social gatherings. Trouble is, Harvey is an imaginary six-and-a-half-foot-tall rabbit. To avoid future embarrassment for her family—and especially for her daughter, Myrtle Mae—Veta decides to have Elwood committed to a sanitarium. At the sanitarium, a frantic Veta explains to the staff that her years of living with Elwood's hallucination have caused her to see Harvey also, and so the doctors mistakenly commit her instead of her mild-mannered brother. The truth comes out, however; Veta is freed, and the search is on for Elwood, who eventually arrives at the sanitarium of his own volition, looking for Harvey. But it seems that Elwood and his invisible companion have had a strange influence on more than one of the doctors. Only at the end does Veta realize that maybe Harvey isn't so bad after all."

Why:

We Decided to look for a comedy for the first semester since our second play selection covers more mature topics. *Harvey* also has twelve characters most of them having a decent amount of stage time with a fair mix of male-to-female roles with several could be any gender. The students will have an opportunity to practice performing skills such as comedic timing, mining (the imaginary rabbit), Getting the chance to act in a period, exploring the past decades (the 1940s), and character development for various character types. The students would also have opportunities to help with unique technical opportunities, the special effects of the imaginary rabbit interacting with the set.

"We want to believe that serendipity brings us together, but is that just a myth? Mining the comedy of missed connections, THIS RANDOM WORLD asks the serious question of how often we travel parallel paths through the world without noticing. From an ailing woman who plans one final trip, to her daughter planning one great escape and her son falling prey to a prank gone wrong, this funny, intimate, and heartbreaking play explores the lives that may be happening just out of reach of our own."

Why:

We wanted to pick a play with real-world topics that students may be dealing with on a day-to-day. Giving them a chance to learn about and work through those topics making them less taboo. We also wanted to give the students to work with a script that is reminiscent of absurdism but is still palatable for young artists and audiences. The students will be able to practice performing skills such as monologues, duo scenes, and balancing comedic relief within a dramatic play.
